These are the millionaire eggplant.

I know the leaf is daggy but the eggplant shown are 150 to 200mm long. Two, for a four dish moussaka.

Out of one plant, which is a beautiful plant and would not be out of place by the house, we will get at least 15, maybe 20 eggplants over 100mm.

three per plant.

Just a quick note to thank you for the excellent Passport Melon seeds once  
again.



We have had about 10 good size (a  
couple at 2kg) melons this year; as  
good as we've ever eaten.

Our garden is 25m above the  
Tamar River and even though it  
has a SE aspect it does receive long  
sun exposure as the garden is in an  
open paddock.

We also harvested 3 Yellow Doll watermelons, 30 capsicum, countless eggplant and over 1kg chilli (from 2 seeds/plants).

By the way, there are another 20 fruit, baseball size right now but probably a bit late to ripen but we live in hope.



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Thank you to all of you who have purchased seeds from us, who have found time on your holidays to pop in and see us and say hello, and seen that Inspirations Garden Centre really does exist and we do do all this work!

We will be at AGFEST again in May site M96 with the full range of seeds, shallots, garlic and some seedlings. Looking forward to seeing valued patrons again and new faces.



**Sow Now:** Our Autumn sown red and brown onions, garlic, shallots, potato onions, broad beans; paramo, red epicure and purple flowered, as well as green manures.

**Harvest:** first leeks, pumpkins, English spinach, lettuces, parsley, and more.

Make relishes, sauces and store dry beans for winter use, freeze edamame beans, spare capsicums, chillis and many more for winter use.

Next month we look at the history of one green manure we stock named Serratas from the original plant 'serradella', and why there really are specific green manures that have been bred for specific regions to do have a specific job.

This year is the year of the pulse, so naturally we will look at the histories and value of many of the legumes we have to offer for you, the home gardener, throughout the year.
